I, WILLIAM SEPTON MOORHOUSE, Superintendent of the Province of Canterbury, in exercise of the powers vested in me in that behalf, do hereby this day prorogue the Provincial Council of the said Province, and the said Provincial Council is hereby prorogued accordingly.

ADDRESS

Of His Honor the Superintendent on proroguing the Provincial Council, December 3, 1858.

MR. SPEAKER AND GENTLEMEN OF THE PROVINCIAL COUNCIL:—

I have assented on behalf of his Excellency the Governor to the following Bills:—

The Canterbury Police Ordinance.

The Immigration Barracks Ordinance.

The Planting Forest Trees Ordinance.

The Cattle Trespass Amendment Ordinance.

The Cathedral Square Ordinance.

The Public Hospital Ordinance.

The Appropriation Ordinance.

The Christ's College Amendment Ordinance.

The Sheep Ordinance.

And I have reserved for his Excellency's assent,

The Scab Prevention Ordinance.

GENTLEMEN—

The labours of the Session having come to an end, I have to thank you for the very earnest and business-like manner in which you have discussed the several proposals it has been my duty to lay before you. The public must, in common with myself, feel perfectly satisfied that the affairs of the province have been closely investigated.

The liberal supplies you have voted shall be economically expended, and

all diligence used to forward each of the public works determined on.

The Canterbury Loan Debentures having been advantageously negotiated, no difficulty stands in the way of a constant stream of immigration. By advices from Mr. Fitz Gerald (to whose activity the province is much indebted) I learn that we may expect numerous arrivals of laborers during the present summer.

The disbursements authorised in aid of the different denominations for the building and enlargement of their places of public worship shall be appropriated with strict regard to the spirit of your resolutions.

Prompt measures will be taken to secure to the province, at the earliest possible date, the incalculable advantage of railway communication between the Port and Plains.

I regret that you have failed during this Session to recognise the very urgent necessity that exist for the enactment of a measure providing for the creation of Public Boards, enabling the inhabitants of towns to provide an effective system of sewerage, and other necessary improvements which are especially essential to health and good order, and the expenses of which cannot with justice be charged upon the general funds of the province.

I trust that during the recess the prosperity of the province may continue unabated, and that upon your next meeting you will have reason to congratulate yourselves on the beneficial results of your deliberations.

I now declare this Council to be prorogued until Tuesday, the 25th day of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty nine.

I, W. S. MOORHOUSE, the Superintendent of the Province of Canterbury in pursuance of the powers vested in me in this behalf, do hereby, upon the recommendation of the Provincial Council, make the following Reserves for the undermentioned purposes, viz. :

Six hundred and forty acres on the Salt-water Creek, about three miles above the ford, being a block of land

one mile square on both sides of the creek, and numbered 119 in red on the maps in the Land Office, Christchurch, for the purposes of a township.

Fifteen hundred acres more or less, bounded on the north and west by the river Hurunui, on the east by Taylor's Creek, running into lake Sumner, and on the south by a line drawn parallel to the Hurunui, so as to include such quantity, and numbered 115 in red on the maps in the Land Office, Christchurch, for the purposes of a township.

Fifteen hundred acres, more or less, bounded on the north by the river Grey to the first gorge, on the west by the sea coast, on the south by a line from the coast to the gorge, so as to include such quantity, and numbered 118 in red on the maps of the Land Office, Christchurch, for the purposes of a township.

Five acres, more or less, situate at Rickman's Corner, on the Lower Lincoln-road, about five miles from Christchurch, south of and adjoining the Gravel-pit Reserve, No. 110, having a frontage to the road of 7 chains 30 links and numbered 128 in red on the maps in the Land Office, Christchurch, for a Church and School.

Five acres, more or less, situate on a branch of the Taitapu, north-west of, and adjoining rural section No. 552 fronting on a road, and numbered 125 in red on the maps in the Land Office, Christchurch, for a Church and School.

Five acres, more or less, situate on the North-road, about $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Christchurch, fronting the North-road, near the new ford, and numbered 129 in red on the maps in the Land Office, Christchurch for a Church and School.

Five acres, more or less, situate in the centre of Kaiapoi Island, fronting the road, at the south-west corner of rural section 740, and about ten miles from Christchurch, and numbered 127 in red on the maps in the Land Office, Christchurch, for a Church.

Five acres, more or less, situate on the line of the Kaiapoi and Rangiora direct road, in the fork about two miles south of Rangiora, and numbered 126 in red on the maps in the Land Office, Christchurch, for a Church and School.

Five acres, more or less, situate on the Harewood-road, by Papanui, fronting the road, about $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Christchurch, on the Northern side of Coster's section, and west of Papanui

Church, and numbered 130 in red on the maps in the Land Office, Christchurch, for a Church and School.

Five acres more or less, at Harewood Forest in the Fork formed by the junction of the roads from Riccarton and Rangiora, and numbered 131 in red on the maps in the Land Office, Christchurch, for a Church and School.

Five acres, more or less, at Rangiora, situate at the back of rural section 917, near trig. pole M. 29, and numbered 124 in red on the maps in the Land Office, Christchurch, for a Cemetery in connection with the Church of England.

Ten acres, situate at Rangiora, north of and adjoining rural section 1197, having 10 chains frontage on a road leading to the Ashley and back easterly adjoining section 1197 ten chains, and numbered 132 in red on the maps in the Land Office, Christchurch, for purposes of public recreation.

One rood and thirty perches, situate in the town of Akaroa, bounded on the north by Brittan-street, on the south by rural section 200, on the east by Pompallier-street, on the west by Lavaud-street, and numbered 138 in red on the map of the town of Akaroa, for a Church and School in connection with the Free Church of Scotland.

Two acres, situate in Akaroa, in the fork formed by South-street and the road on the north-west of rural section 776, and numbered 139 in red on the map of Akaroa, for a cemetery in connection with the Free Church of Scotland.

Six hundred and forty acres, situate near Arowenua Bush, on the northern bank of the Tumukaha, bounded on the east by a line through trig. pole 7, extending easterly towards the sea coast about one mile, back northerly on the average one mile, and numbered 141 in red on the maps in the Land Office, Christchurch, for a township.

One rood, more or less, being a spit or tongue of land running out into the sea, opposite rural section 207, in Pigeon-Bay, and numbered 140 in red on the map in the Land Office, Christchurch, for ship-building purposes.

Six hundred and forty acres on the northern bank of the Wantangi, commencing at a point about eleven miles from the sea (nearly opposite the Maori Kaika, on the Otago side), extending down the river easterly about two miles, and back northerly about half-a-mile, and numbered 134 in red

on the maps in the Land Office, Christchurch, for a township.

One hundred acres on the northern bank of the Rangitata, commencing opposite trig. pole 21, and extending down the bank of the river between the top of the terrace and edge of the river to the extent of 100 acres, and numbered 135 in red on the maps in the Land Office, Christchurch, for a Ferry and House of Accommodation.

One hundred acres on the southern bank of the Rangitata, opposite trig. pole 21, extending down the bank of the river about 40 chains, and back southerly 25 chains, and numbered 136 in red on the map in the Land Office, Christchurch, for a Ferry.

One hundred and sixty acres, situate on the northern bank of the river Ashburton, at the fork, about ten miles from the sea, in a direct line, having 40 chains frontage to the river, and extending back northerly 40 chains, and numbered 137 in red on the maps in the Land Office, Christchurch, for a Ferry and House of Accommodation.

Ten acres on the South or Springs'-road, having 10 chains frontage to the road, and extending back in a rectangular block 10 chains, adjoining section 275, and numbered 133 in red on the maps of the Land Office, Christchurch.

REGULATIONS
TO BE OBSERVED BY THE
Immigrants occupying the Immigration Barracks.

1. Accommodation in the Barracks will be afforded to Immigrants, newly arrived for one week, after landing, and no longer.

2. No person shall be allowed to enter the Barracks except by an order from the Immigration Officer.

3. No person shall occupy any room except that named in the admission order of the Immigration Officer.

4. Every room must be swept daily by the persons occupying it, before 9 o'clock A.M., and after 5 P.M., and must be thoroughly cleaned on Wednesday and Saturday.

5. No smoking shall be allowed at any time within the Barracks.

6. All cooking shall be done at such times and in such manner as shall be directed by the person in charge of the Barracks.

7. The Yard and Cooking House must be cleaned every day by the single men, who will perform this duty in turn.

8. All Immigrants accommodated in the Barracks must return thither by 9 o'clock P.M., at which time the Barracks will be closed for the night.

9. No light shall be kept burning in any room in the Barracks after 9 o'clock P.M. except by order of the Immigration Officer.

10. If any person shall violate these Rules, or refuse to obey the instructions of the Immigration Officer or other person in charge of the Barracks, or shall be guilty of any disorderly or offensive conduct, or shall be found under the influence of liquor, he will be immediately discharged from the Barracks and not again allowed to enter them.

11. Any Immigrant remaining in the Barracks after he shall have been ordered by the Immigration Officer to quit will be charged at the rate of 3s. for every night during which he shall so remain.

12. Any stranger refusing to quit the Barracks on being ordered to do so by proper authority will be given into the custody of the Police.

Proclamation.

I, WILLIAM SEFTON MOORHOUSE, Superintendent of the Province of Canterbury, do hereby, in pursuance of the powers vested in me in that behalf, by the Regulations now in force for the disposal, sale, letting, and occupation of the Waste Lands of the Crown within the said Province, Proclaim and Declare that the lands hereinafter described, that is to say:—Three thousand acres more or less, bounded on the north-east by the main stream of the Hurunui, from the Mound crossing to the junction of the Waitohi, on the south-east and south by the Waitohi from its junction with the Hurunui to the point opposite, and due south of the eastern end of the base line, and on the westward by a line from the Eastern end of the base line, to the

Mound crossing, shall be reserved temporarily for the uses of the Provincial Government and for other public purposes.

Given under my hand at Christchurch, and sealed with the Public Seal of the said Province this 27th day of December, 1858.

MESSRS. MALLOCK & WALKER have entered into an engagement with the Provincial Government to lease the foregoing reserve, together with the dipping troughs, sheep yards, and other buildings now in course of construction on the South bank of the Hurunui, and that all sheep introduced into this Province across the North boundary of the Province will be required to be dressed at the troughs on this reserve. Messrs. Mallock and Walker will find all materials and labor necessary for dressing the sheep, and are authorised by the Provincial Government to charge for every flock a fee for the same of 1s. per head for every head of sheep up to 1,000 inclusive, and for all sheep in one flock exceeding 1,000, a fee of 8d. per head.
