#### PROCLAMATION.

By his Excellency Colonel THOMAS GORE BROWNE, Companion of the most Honourable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-chief in and over her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c.

WHEREAS, by an Ordinance enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor and Legislative Council of New Zealand, Session VII.,

No. 8, intituled "An Ordinance to amend the Customs Ordinance," Session I., No. 3, and the "Customs Amendment Ordinance," Session III., No. 6, it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, from time to time, by proclamation, to appoint and define proper places within the several Ports of the Colony to be legal Quays or Landing-places for the lading and unlading of goods, and to appoint the hours within which such goods shall be so laden or unladen.

Now, therefore, I, the Governor, in pursuance of the authority vested in me in that behalf, do hereby proclaim and declare that the legal Quay or Landing-place, at the Port of Collingwood, in Massacre Bay, shall be the Beach at Collingwood, between the north side of Washington-street and a line produced to low-water-mark from the north side of Copenhagen-street, as the same is delineated on the map of the Town of Collingwood, authenticated by the Chief Surveyor of the Province of Nelson; and that all goods shall be laden and unladen at the said Quay or Landing-place, and not elsewhere in the said port.

And I do further proclaim and declare that at the Port of Collingwood aforesaid, goods shall be laden and unladen only within the hours hereinafter specified, and not otherwise, viz. :—

All goods not being goods entered to be warehoused, between the hours of eight in the morning and four o'clock in the afternoon, on and from the 1st day of October to the 31st day of March inclusive, and between the hours of nine o'clock in the morning and four o'clock in the afternoon, on and from the 1st day of April to the 30th day of September inclusive. All goods entered to be warehoused, between the hours of eight o'clock in the morning and three o'clock in the afternoon, on and from the 1st day of October to the 31st day of March inclusive, and between the hours of nine o'clock in the morning and two o'clock in the afternoon, on and from the 1st day of April to the 30th day of September inclusive :

Provided that no goods shall be laden or unladen on Sundays or holidays, and no goods shall be laden or unladen on Saturdays after the hour of two, p.m. :

Provided also that nothing herein contained shall prevent the lading or unlading of any such goods at any other time or place at the said Port of Collingwood, with the permission of the Principal Officer of the Customs.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONERS OF IMMIGRATION FOR THE PROVINCE OF NELSON.

The Board of Commissioners of Immigration have prepared the accompanying statement of receipts and expenditure for the year 1857.

The only existing liability of the Board is the debt of £2,000 to the Board of Trustees of the Nelson Trust Funds.

Want of funds compelled the Commissioners to suspend all operations for the introduction of immigrants in the latter part of the year 1856. Notice was accordingly sent to the Emigration Agent in England to enter into no

fresh arrangements for sending out emigrants beyond what the sum remaining in Mr. Tytler's hands at the end of the year 1856 would warrant. In December of that year the Emigration Agent was informed, that in consequence of the state of the funds his engagement would terminate at the expiration of six months from the date of his receiving the notice. Mr. Macdonald's engagement accordingly terminated on the 9th of November last.

The sum left in Mr. Tytler's hands, after payment of Mr. Macdonald's salary to the date last mentioned, amounted to £168 4s. 8d.

The sum due to the Board by persons who have entered into security for the repayment of passage moneys is £2,690 5s. 2d. Of this sum no less than £2,161 10s. 4d. is owed by immigrants who have been sent out by the Emigration Agent, on their own security for the repayment of the cost of their passages. The balance, £528 14s. 10d., is still owing by residents in the province who have become security for their relatives and others.

In addition to the above sum of £2,161 10s. 4d., the sum of £517 9s. will become due in August next from immigrants sent out on their own security.

The Commissioners recommend that whatever funds accrue for immigration purposes should be employed in the introduction of the relatives and friends of residents in the province by the advance by the Board of the passage money, on security being given in the settlement for the repayment thereof in full.
