**PROCLAMATION.**

By His Excellency Sir GEORGE GREY, a Knight Commander of the most Honourable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Islands of New Zealand, and Governor of the Provinces of New Ulster and New Munster, and Vice Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS, by an Ordinance passed by the Governor-in-Chief of the New Zealand Islands, by and with the consent of the Legislative Council thereof, intituled "An Ordinance for the Naturalization of certain Persons in the Islands of New Zealand," Session XI., No. 9, it is enacted that all and singular the persons who shall be declared to come within the operation of such Ordinance by any Proclamation to be issued in that behalf by His Excellency the Governor-in-Chief, shall be deemed and taken, until the next Session of the General Legislature within the Islands of New Zealand, to be natural born subjects of Her Majesty.

Now therefore, I, the Governor-in-Chief, in pursuance of the power and authority in me vested by the said in part recited Ordinance, do hereby proclaim and declare that the person whose name is underwritten shall be deemed and taken to be a natural born subject of Her Majesty from the date set opposite his name, until the next Session of the General Legislature of the Islands of New Zealand, as fully to all intents and purposes as if his name had been inserted in the Schedule annexed to the said Ordinance.

CIRCULAR—MILITARY.

Downing Street,  
20th of May, 1851.

SIR—It has appeared to me that the clause, numbered 4, of the paper entitled "Information for the use of Military and Naval Officers proposing to settle in the British Colonies," is liable to lead to the erroneous impression that Officers who have become permanent residents in any colony without having obtained permission to retire from the Army or Navy for that purpose previously to their leaving this country, are entitled to share in the advantages held out in that Paper. I have accordingly thought it proper that the clause in question should be omitted; and I transmit to you herewith a copy of the Paper so amended.

INFORMATION FOR THE USE OF MILITARY AND NAVAL OFFICERS PROPOSING TO SETTLE IN CERTAIN OF THE BRITISH COLONIES.

1. The colonies in which Military and Naval Officers are allowed privileges in the

acquisition of public lands, are the following: *First*, the Australian Settlements, consisting of New South Wales, Van Diemen's Land, South Australia, Western Australia, and the Northern Province of New Zealand; *Secondly*, Ceylon; and *Thirdly*, the Cape of Good Hope.

2. In the different Australian settlements, in Ceylon, and at the Cape of Good Hope, land is disposed of by sale only; but Officers purchasing land are allowed a remission of the purchase money, according to the under-mentioned scale:

Field Officers, of 25 years' service and upwards, in the whole.....	£600
Field Officers, of 20 years' service and upwards, in the whole .....	500
Field Officers, of 15 or less years' service, in the whole .....	400
Captains, of 20 years' service and upwards, in the whole .....	400
Captains, of 15 years' service or less, in the whole	300
Subalterns, of 20 years' service and upwards, in the whole .....	300
Subalterns, of 7 years' service and upwards, on the whole .....	200
Subalterns, under 7 years' standing, are not entitled to any remission in the purchase of Land.	

Regimental Staff Officers, and Medical Officers of the Army and Navy, are allowed the benefit of this rule.

3. Officers of the Army or Navy, proposing to proceed to the colonies, in order to take advantage of this indulgence, should provide themselves with certificates from the office of the Commander-in-Chief, or of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, or of the Master-General of the Ordnance, showing that their emigration has been sanctioned, and stating exactly their rank and length of service. No document from the office of the Secretary of State is necessary.

4. Military Chaplains, Commissariat Officers, and Officers of any of the Civil Departments of the Army. Pursers, Chaplains, Midshipmen, Warrant Officers of every description, and Officers of any of the Civil Departments of the Navy, are not allowed any privileges in respect of land. Although members of these classes may have been admitted formerly, and under different circumstances, they are now excluded. Mates in the Royal Navy rank with Ensigns in the Army, and Mates of three years' standing, with Lieutenants in the Army, and are entitled respectively to corresponding privileges in the acquisition of lands.

5. Gentlemen who have ceased to belong to Her Majesty's Service are not allowed the advantages to which they were entitled while in the Army or Navy. This rule, however, is not to affect Officers who desire to quit the Service, for the express purpose of settling in the Colonies; it is only required, that, when they resign their Commissions, they should apply for a certificate from the Commander-in-Chief, or from the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, or from the Master-General of the Ordnance, that they do so with the view of emigrating, and such certificate, if produced to the Governor of any of the Colonies before men-

tionde, within one year from its date, *but not otherwise*, will be a sufficient warrant for allowing the bearer the same advantages as Officers who are still in Her Majesty's Service.

6. An actual residence of two years in the colony must be proved before the Titles can be granted, except in cases in which death may have occurred before the expiration of that period.

7. For the convenience of Officers, the following heads are subjoined of the Rules for the sale of land in the Australian settlements :

All Lands are disposed of by sale alone, and must have been once at least exposed to public auction.

The lowest upset price is not less than £1 per acre ; but the Government has power to raise the same by Proclamation, though not again to reduce it.

The lands are distinguished into three different classes ; viz., Town Lots, Suburban Lots, and Country Lots.

Upon Town and Suburban Lots, as well as upon a proportion not exceeding one-tenth of the whole of the Country Lots offered for sale at any auction, the Governor has the power of naming a higher than the general or lowest upset price : these last to be designated "Special Country Lots."

Town and Suburban Lots are in no case disposed of except by public auction ; but country lots, which have already been put up to public auction, and not sold, may be disposed of afterwards by private contract at the upset price.

No Lands are sold by private contract, except for ready money. When sold by public auction, one-tenth at least of the whole purchase-money must be put down, and the remainder within one calendar month, or the deposit is forfeited.

Lands are put up for sale in Lots not exceeding one square mile in extent.

8. In Ceylon, land is sold by auction at an upset price, which is to be fixed by the Governor, but which is not to be less than £1 per acre. Before the lands are exposed for sale, they will be surveyed by the Government, and duly advertised.

9. At the Cape of Good Hope the upset price is 2s. per acre in the old colony, and 4s. per acre in the District of Natal.

10. The several prices above mentioned are of course subject to a revision at any time by the proper authorities, and the pecuniary amount of the Remission made to Officers cannot be increased on account of an increased value set upon the lands.

SIR—I herewith transmit, for your information and guidance, the Copy of a Letter from the Board of Trade respecting the payment to that Department of certain of the Penalties levied under the Mercantile Marine Act, 13 and 14 Victoria, cap. 93. I also enclose the Copy of a Letter on this subject, which I caused to be addressed to the Board of Treasury, with an extract from a letter received from the Lords Commissioners in reply.

I have to instruct you to take the necessary steps for causing the penalties in question to be paid into the Commissariat Chest, as suggested by the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, and the Certificates of such payments to be from time to time forwarded to this Department, for transmission to the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade.

SIR—I am directed by the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade to call the attention of Earl Grey to the following statement :

By 7 & 8 Victoria, c. 112, s. 62, certain penalties, recoverable under that Act, were made payable to the Seamen's Hospital Society, and by the Mercantile Marine Act, 13 & 14 Victoria, c. 23, sec. 111, such penalties, if inflicted after the 1st of January last, are made payable to the Board of Trade, or as it may direct. As the former Act extends to ships registered in the United Kingdom, in whatever part of the empire they may be, and also in certain cases to other British ships, many penalties are inflicted under it in Colonial Ports which ought, in future, to be paid to the Board of Trade. My Lords are, therefore, desirous that such instructions should be given to the Clerks of the Justices, or other officers receiving such penalties in the Seaports in the Colonies, as may insure their due payment to the Board of Trade ; and I am to request you to move Earl Grey to take such steps as he may consider expedient for that purpose.

*Extract from a Letter from Sir C. E. Trevelyan to Herman Merivale, Esq., dated Treasury Chambers, 8th May, 1851.*

"I am commanded by the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury to acquaint you, for the information of Earl Grey, in reply to your Letter dated 23rd Ultimo, that the Commissariat Officers in the Colonies are required, by their instructions, to receive into the Commissariat Chest all Moneys tendered to them by a Colonial Government for remittance to England on the Public Service, and to grant Certificates of the sums so received; and upon those certificates being transmitted to this Board, the Paymaster General is authorized to issue like sums to the parties in whose favour they are granted.

"My Lords therefore would suggest that the Governors of the Colonies be instructed, not only to cause the sums referred to in Mr. Booth's Letter dated 3rd Ultimo, to be paid into the Commissariat Chest, as proposed by Lord Grey, but also to cause the Certificates of such payments to be forwarded to the proper Officer of the Board of Trade, for transmission to this Board in support of the claim to reimbursement of the amount."

SIR—As vessels from New Zealand frequently pass amongst the Islands in this neighbourhood, many of which (particularly of the Paumotu Group) appear to be very incorrectly laid down on the Charts:

I do myself the honour of transmitting to your Excellency, herewith, the copies of two letters which I have received from the French Commissioner at this place, communicating the rectified positions of the Island of Toobouai and six of the Paumotu or Low Islands, as ascertained by recent surveys of French Hydrographers.

MONSIEUR LE CONSUL—A la suite du travail hydrographique de Mr. Delamarche, cet ingénieur hydrographe m'a adressé l'observation suivante.

L'île de Toubouai est mal placée sur les cartes actuelles.

Le mât de pavillon situé au nord de l'île, environ à son milieu, est par 23° 21' 45" Latitude sud, et 151° 55' 44" Longitude Ouest, (de Paris).

La variation est de 9° 38' 10" N.E.

Le mouillage situé à l'interruption du récif à environ 2500 mètres du mât de pavillon, le relevant dans le S.  $\frac{1}{4}$  E. du monde, est fort mauvais. Le fond est de corail, tel qu'on chasse on qu'on perd ses ancres. On n'y est nullement à l'abri: les goëlettes peuvent être convenablement mouillées près de terre. Il y a des pilotes et il ne serait pas prudent de s'en passer.

Ces renseignements intéressant vivement la navigation, j'ai l'honneur de les porter immédiatement à votre connaissance, en vous informant que je les fais également parvenir en France, et à tous nos Consuls dans ces mers.

MONSIEUR LE CONSUL—Les travaux hydrographiques exécutés, d'après mes ordres, en Octobre 1850, par M. l'Ingénieur Delamarche et par M. le Capitaine Gizolme, ont, entre autres résultats, conduit à constater d'énormes inexactitudes sur les positions que donnent les cartes actuelles aux Iles Pomotou *Mani*, *Vahé*, *Rurick*, et *Vliegen*. Comme ces îles bordent un passage très fréquenté par les navires qui viennent à Tahiti par le nord, comme de plus, on ne les aperçoit que lorsque on est pour ainsi dire dessus, je crois utile de porter à la connaissance des navigateurs, leurs positions exactes.

CROWN TITLES.

**H**IS Excellency the LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR directs it to be notified that Grantees who have not availed themselves of the right of selection given by the Crown Titles Ordinance, Session 10, No. 4, within the time prescribed, who may be desirous of receiving amended Grants on the terms and conditions provided by the 11th clause of the said Ordinance, must make application in writing, addressed to the Colonial Secretary, on or before the first day of October, 1852.

His Excellency further directs it to be notified that, for the purpose of expediting the settlement of claims and to meet the convenience of Grantees, the necessary Survey may, in certain cases, be performed by the Grantee's own surveyor, and the selection made by the Commissioner at the suggestion of the Grantee.

For general information, a copy of the clause above alluded to is hereunto annexed.

"11. And be it further enacted, that, if such selection as aforesaid be not made by the Grantee, his Heirs, Appointees, or Assigns, before the said first day of July, 1851, it shall be lawful for the Governor or other the Officer administering the government of the Province for the time being, in the case of Deeds of Grant, wherein the land of which the Grantee is recited to be entitled to a grant forms a part only of the whole quantity claimed, and is not set forth or described by definite metes or bounds, to cause the particular piece or parcel of land, not exceeding the quantity to which such Grantee shall be recited to be entitled to, to be determined by such Commissioner as aforesaid, and to make a grant thereof to the Grantee named in such grant as aforesaid, his Heirs or Assigns, on payment into the Colonial Treasury, by such Grantee, his Heirs or Assigns, of the costs, charges, and expenses incurred by the Commissioner in the discharge of such duty as aforesaid, and in causing the necessary surveys to be made of the land to be comprised in any such Grant. And the legal estate in such land, unless it be otherwise provided in such last-mentioned deed of Grant, shall be deemed to have been vested in such

Grantee at the date of such first-mentioned Grant as aforesaid. *Provided always* that in case such payment shall not be made within twelve calendar months after it shall have been notified in the *Government Gazette* that such grant as aforesaid is ready for delivery, the land comprised therein shall thereupon become and be deemed and taken to be, to all intents and purposes, demesne lands of the Crown."
